Life as a New Lead

I work for a large university hospital where I rotate in a variety of areas between our adult and children's hospitals. I've worked in the acute care laboratory as a Medical Laboratory Scientist for two years and five months now. I've been transitioning into my new role as the Chemistry Technical Lead for a little over one month now. I'd like to share with you what this time of change has been like.

I've been preparing and working towards this goal of being in a leadership role since I first started. After completing my training period as a new hire, I jumped right in - taking on extra responsibilities around the lab and working on special projects. I started small. A co-worker was going on matematic leave and my supervisor

maternity leave and my supervisor was looking for someone to cover this person's extra job responsibilities. I volunteered to help, monitoring that temperature logs were completed. I then

started taking on my own extra

projects. I found myself passionate about our outpatient laboratory services and quickly became the supervisor's right-hand person, working on many process improvement initiatives. Many times this required extra hours. Don't be afraid of extra work! This is your opportunity to develop your professional reputation, to learn new skills, and to gain great experience.

If you're aspiring towards a formal leadership role, you must first demonstrate your abilities as an informal leader. What does that really mean? An informal leader doesn't have a title to fall back on that gives them authority. People <u>choose</u> to follow them because they demonstrate the qualities of a great leader and have earned the respect of others. Because I spent two years as an informal leader in my lab, my transition to this formal role as the Chemistry Lead is smoother. My co-workers know they can rely on me, that I will always provide help, and that it is safe to put their trust in me. Even though I have a lot left to learn to become a Chemistry expert, my co-workers are confident in me because of the leadership characteristics I've demonstrated on a daily basis.

So, what is the daily life of a lead like? There are so many things that are done behind-the-scenes that I wasn't exposed to before. I am learning all sorts of new things and that is one of the best parts! I'm learning how to enter CAP (College of American Pathologists) proficiency testing results into their online entry system.

You have to be very detail-oriented because

one typo could result in a failure and put your lab at risk. I'm becoming very comfortable with calling our instrument service team for help troubleshooting issues over the phone. I learn more and more with each problem that arises, but there is still much that I don't know. If you find

yourself in a new role like this, remember that you won't have answers 100% of the time. That's okay. It's how you respond that matters. When a co-worker comes to me with an issue that stumps me, I'll say, "That's a great question. I don't know the answer, but I'm going to make sure we use the right people and resources to find out." I'm fortunate to work with our extremely knowledgeable Chemistry Technical Specialist who supports me in this role. She treats me as an equal and her goal is to help me grow to a point that no matter which one of us is around, we can do everything the other can.

A big part of the job is teaching. I train our students and new hires, as well as current employees who are adding another testing area to their repertoire. I love watching people have that "Ah-ha!" moment when you can tell that whatever you said just made things click. It is extremely rewarding! I am also responsible for administering annual competency assessments throughout the year. Making the deadline is very important, so I often multitask in order to do some of these assessments when I'm on the bench and the workload is lower. I also train others on new instruments as we implement them.

The last thing I want to touch on is my contribution to the workplace culture and morale. At a lead level, in many ways you are still viewed as a peer. In my opinion, this gives you an even greater opportunity to help shape the staff culture and attitude. In leading by example, you help set the tone and demonstrate the positive perspective you want to encourage in others. I make a conscious effort to arrive each day ready to work, to help, to be flexible, and to keep my stress level from negatively impacting others. This can be hard to do and I'm sure I don't always succeed. Having the right



attitude and always showing others respect makes teamwork possible and allows us to provide patients the best care! As a leader, I have an extra level of responsibility in promoting a great workplace culture.

While being a Technical Lead comes with extra challenges and a heavier workload, it also provides many rewards. I love helping others and really enjoy the special projects I get to be involved with. I experience greater satisfaction with my job when I'm learning new skills. One of my favorite quotes is, "If we are growing, we are always going to be outside our comfort zone." -John C. Maxwell. Wherever you are in your career, I hope you are encouraged to take advantage of opportunities to grow as a laboratory professional.
